


Welcome to Resurrection Faith Formation for children and youth! Families, catechists and parish staff, are joined in fulfilling the Church's mission. The Church's mission is: This is my body given for you.

The Eucharist is the source and summit of the Christian life. The term "Eucharist" originates from the Greek word Eucharistic, meaning thanksgiving. In the celebration of the Eucharist, bread and wine become the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ through the power of the Holy Spirit and the instrumentality of the priest. The whole Christ is truly present -- body, blood, soul, and divinity -- under the appearances of bread and wine, the glorified Christ who rose from the dead. This is what the Church means when she speaks of the "Real Presence" of Christ in the Eucharist.

Our parish staff and catechists are excited to join you in this sacred mission! Each year, the Catholic Church in the United States designates the third Sunday in September as "Catechetical Sunday"— a day on which to celebrate and pray for the Church's mission to teach the Gospel to all people. In 2022, the Church will celebrate Catechetical Sunday on **September 18, 2022**, under the theme of "*I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you*." On this day, catechists are formally commissioned for ministry to the community. Catechetical Sunday is a wonderful opportunity to reflect on the role that each baptized person plays in handing on the faith and being a witness to the Gospel. Catechetical Sunday is an opportunity for all to rededicate themselves to this mission as a community of faith.

In the year ahead, place your trust in our God who is ever present in the sacred and the everyday. It is his Holy Spirit which continues to inspire and guide us in the fulfillment of our Church's mission. The Resurrection parish and staff is partnered with you in this calling and promise to support and encourage you through prayer, witness and example as you strive to model our faith within the context of your family.

PARENTS BAPTISMAL COMMITMENT

The Catechism of the Catholic Church speaks directly to the right and duty of parents to educate their children in the faith.

Through the grace of the Sacrament of Marriage, parents receive the responsibility and privilege of evangelizing their children. Parents should initiate their children at an early age into the mysteries of the faith of which they are the "first heralds" for their children. They should associate them from their tenderest years with the life of the Church. A wholesome family life can foster interior dispositions that are a genuine preparation for a living faith and remain a support for it throughout one's life.

Our Resurrection Catholic Community is prepared to help parents with this awesome responsibility of passing on the Catholic faith to our young people. We offer high-quality core catechetical programs in which many dedicated volunteer catechists give countless hours preparing their meeting places, their "lessons" and their hearts. They have also committed additional time to workshops, seminars and meetings in order to provide their groups with the best faith-sharing leadership possible.

PARENTS can provide an excellent model of faith to your children by...

- fulfilling the promise, you made at the baptism of your child to be the first and best teacher of the faith to your child
- modeling and encouraging full participation in the life of our parish community through
- worship and service
- helping your child/ren learn their prayers and essential Catholic teachings
- sharing with your child/teen the need for them to be respectful, attentive and cooperative
- making every effort to have your children attend sessions promptly and faithfully
- reviewing any missed material prior to the next session
- encouraging your child/teen to participate in parish youth activities and service opportunities
- reviewing any rules or procedures the catechist has made known to their group
- seeking ways in which you can become more involved in Faith Formation offerings at Resurrection
- supporting the ministry of catechesis with personal prayer

YOUNG PEOPLE attending Faith Formation are expected to:

- participate in our weekly Sunday Liturgy
- come to each session with an open and positive attitude
- cooperate with the catechist in order to maintain an atmosphere of mutual respect
- participate fully and appropriately in their group's activities
- treat the parish property and the property of others with respect
- give parents any information distributed by catechists
- settle matters peacefully without resorting to violence; no fighting, kicking, use of bad language, etc. is allowed
- stay on parish grounds at all times unless given permission otherwise
- follow safety rules for arrivals and dismissals as set by the Director of Faith Formation

SPECIAL NEEDS

It is our goal to embrace all of God's children in our ministry. Occasionally children come to us who present special needs. In an effort to welcome all children and meet the individual needs of each child, we ask that parents share all specific information regarding their child/ren's individual needs: i.e. physical limitations, medical concerns and special learning needs. Every effort will be made to provide one-on-one assistance if needed. If specially trained personnel cannot be provided, our staff will work with parents and invite their participation to help meet the specific needs of their child.

SACRAMENTAL FORMATION INFORMATION

The Diocese of Joliet requires ongoing Faith Formation participation prior to celebrating a sacrament. Students who choose to postpone sacramental preparation are expected to continue their Faith Formation until ready to receive the sacraments of Reconciliation, Eucharist and Confirmation. The reception of these sacraments should not be viewed as a graduation. Rather it is understood that all baptized Catholics share the call to life-long Faith Formation and are expected to participate.

FIRST RECONCILIATION

Guidelines put forth by our Bishops concerning baptized children, specify that the Sacrament of Reconciliation should be received prior to First Communion. At Resurrection, the formal preparation for these sacraments traditionally begins in the Fall of Grade 2 and requires parental involvement in meetings, workshops and the completion of sacramental preparation materials at home. Older children who request these Sacraments are provided with age-appropriate preparation materials and participate in other formational activities as outlined by the Director.

FIRST COMMUNION

All First Communicants and their families are expected to:

- participate in faith formation process for a minimum of two consecutive years
- participate in our weekly Sunday worship.
- participate fully and our Parish Children's Faith Formation.
- attend parent and children's sessions, workshops, and retreats.
- complete all in-home sacramental materials.
- celebrate the Sacrament of First Reconciliation prior to the celebration of First Communion.
- together with the Pastor and Director, assess the child's readiness for the celebration of First Communion.

CHRISTIAN FORMATION COMMISSION

MISSION STATEMENT

We, the Christian Formation Commission of Resurrection Catholic Community, are dedicated to providing for the spiritual formation of the entire community by offering opportunities that foster a deeper understanding of the Catholic faith and an awareness of the Mission of God's people in building and living God's Kingdom. Our work will:

- Be filled with the spirit of the Gospel
- Call forth the God-given gifs of the entire community
- Be evidenced in expressions of faith-filled words and deeds
- Will result in a faith-filled, spiritual community that understands the value of Christian faith formation of all ages, lives the values of Catholic Tradition and thirsts to continually enrich, educate and renew itself.

MEMBERSHIP

Members must be zealous and willing to give generously of their time and effort, mindful that their interest and concerns must be for their respective ministries and the Commission. The term of membership is three years. The function of the Faith Formation Commission Membership is to be visionaries for the faith formation of the Resurrection Catholic Community.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF A COMMISSION MEMBER:

- To attend monthly Commission meetings and annual joint Parish Council-Commissions Meeting.
- To represent each of the Faith Formation ministries by assisting communication between the ministries and the Commission.
- To plan, implement and evaluate spiritual formation opportunities.
- To be available and be able to participate in events of spiritual formation.

2022-2023 MEMBERSHIP AND CONTACT INFORMATION

For current Chair and contact information, please see the Directory Page in the front of this handbook. The commission is made of staff members and parishioners. We invite you to come and sit in at one of our meetings.

Our Commission invites input from all parishioners. If a parishioner has an item of interest or concern to share with the Commission, a request may be made to address the Commission by contacting the Commission Chairperson. If a parishioner would like to address the Commission, all requests must be made one week prior to the next scheduled meeting in order to be placed on the agenda.

MEETING TIME & LOCATION

The Commission usually meets monthly on Mondays, late afternoon/early evening in the Parish Offices. Actual dates are determined by the availability of the group and the needs of staff and parish council. PARISH REGISTRATION

All families wishing to enroll their children in Faith Formation programs must first be a registered member of Resurrection Catholic Community. On January 1, 1993, we declared ourselves a Covenant Community. A Covenant is a signed document, an agreement between you and the community, that we will be faithful and supportive of one another. Christianity is not an individual religion; it is a communal one- - a community with Jesus Christ as head.

BECOMING PART OF OUR COMMUNITY

All families registering with our parish are required to attend a Newcomers Orientation Session usually held on the fourth Sunday of the month immediately following the 10:30 mass. The monthly orientation meeting allows newcomers to become acquainted with the parish staff, to meet other families and to be informed about the ministries and services that our parish offers. To complete one's registration a signing of the parish covenant is required. Arrangements can be made to register for newcomer's sessions by contacting the Resurrection Pastoral Center.

PHILOSOPHY

Our parish community is committed to assist and support parents as we work together through our Faith Formation Programs to provide our children and teens an opportunity to develop knowledge and understanding of their faith, prayer and service opportunities.

SAFETY MEASURES

The care and safety of our children, youth and volunteers is of primary importance. For this reason, Resurrection Church has adopted the following safety measures to avoid and/or respond to emergencies:

- **No SNACKS.** Due to current health and safety concerns no snacks will give.
- All catechists have been provided with procedures in the event of fire, tornado, the presence of blood borne pathogens, and lockdown.
- **Evacuation plans and emergency numbers** are posted at the entrance of each classroom.
- For the safety of our young people, all NO PARKING/STANDNG and FIRE ZONES SIGNS must be observed when transporting participants to Faith Formation and Youth Ministry events.
- No child in grades 1 5 will be dismissed into the parking lot unattended. Parents are expected to park, enter the building and await dismissal in Marvin Hall Narthex no sooner than 15 minutes prior to the end of class. Children in grade 6 may escort younger siblings to the parking lot with parent permission.
- For security reasons, there will be limited access to the faith formation building. <u>All</u> <u>entrances will be locked with the exception of the upper level, entrance #3.</u>
 Please ring the bell located by this entrance if you need to enter the building at alternate times. See the table below.

CANCELLATION OF CLASSES

In the event of an emergency or inclement weather, there will be an announcement made via a direct text message through FlockNote. This will also be posted on the parish website resurrectioncc.com. When possible, please listen or watch for an announcement on local TV and radio stations. Please do not call the parish office. We follow the decision of U-46 to cancel school or dismiss early.

ATTENDANCE

Faith Formation supports— not supplants— the faith development that stems from the home. Faith Formation sessions provide structured formal and age-appropriate catechetical instruction. Every student is expected to attend all sessions unless excused for illness or family concerns. All Resurrection families are asked to make the Faith Formation Calendar a priority when scheduling youth and family activities. **In the event of an absence, parents are asked to inform the Faith Formation Office by calling** <u>630-289-5400 x 214</u>. **Catechists are asked to take attendance during the first 15 minutes of the session.** If, for any reason, a young person misses a session, parents are asked to see that the material is covered prior to the next scheduled session.

VISITORS TO THE PROGRAM (Due to COVID restrictions, we are no longer encouraging visitors currently.)

Parents/guardians are encouraged to visit during the year but are asked to give notification in advance. Students who wish to bring a guest to class may do so, but they should notify the catechist and the Director in advance. Those guests should share materials. Frequent guests will be required to enroll formally in Faith Formation.

PARTIES

No parties or food allowed in classrooms or in Marvin Hall due to the restrictions by the State due to COVID-19.

LOST AND FOUND

We cannot accept responsibility for lost items. All articles and books should be marked with the student's name so they can be returned. Lost items without names will be brought to the Faith Formation Office for two weeks; unclaimed items will then be given to charity.

MEDICATION

Catechists cannot dispense any medication, even aspirin. Parents/Guardians must decide and provide the Director with written permission to dispense prescription medication if needed. Prescription medicines must be in original container from the pharmacy and clearly labeled. If

a student is on medication during the school year, we ask that the student remain on medication while attending Faith Formation classes.

FIRST AID

In the event of medical emergency, the person listed on the emergency form will be notified. If a student complains of not feeling well, he/she should be sent to the office and the parents will be notified. In the event a child is bleeding, catechists are to take necessary precautions according to 1st Responder guidelines.

CONFERENCES

Occasionally, a conference may be requested by a parent/guardian, a catechist or the Faith Formation Director. Parents/Guardians are encouraged to contact the catechist for updates on the student's progress and the Director of Faith Formation for other concerns. FAITH FORMATION PROGRAMS

All children and teens participating in our weekly Faith Formation program options will explore the Sunday Scriptures as part of their Faith Formation. They will spend time "Breaking Open the Word" during every session. In addition to scripture study, all young people will also have a core curriculum to guide the catechetical process. As our children grow, so does the content explored at each grade level.

PROTECTING GOD'S CHILDREN

All parents are encouraged to participate in the one-time required diocesan course, Protecting God's Children. All volunteers who assist in our Faith Formation sessions, chaperone events, transport children and youth, assist with service projects or outings, must have completed this course. In addition to information valuable to volunteers, the content of the course also provides parents with excellent information regarding the protection and safety of your children.

DISCIPLINE

Discipline is not punishment. Nor does it mean keeping quiet! Discipline is an inner orderliness and control with a purpose. The purpose is to help persons be disciples- --learners and followers of Jesus. A group with good discipline is one where persons gladly work toward learning and living the Gospel. Respect for oneself and others is the hallmark of a Christ follower. To provide a safe, Christ—centered environment for our youth, parents are asked to review the following policies & guidelines that children/teens are expected to observe:

WEAPONS/DRUGS/ALCOHOL STATEMENT

Unfortunately, we live in an age where it is necessary to state clearly the following: The Diocese of Joliet's policy on weapons expressly forbids possession of firearms or other dangerous weapons on or in diocesan property. Property includes buildings and parking areas. Likewise, the unlawful manufacture, distribution, transfer, purchase, use or being under the influence of illegal substances is strictly forbidden. As tobacco products do not promote healthy choices for youth, the diocese asks students and adults to refrain from using these products during youth events/classes.

HARASSMENT POLICY

These guidelines of the Diocese of Joliet are important to create a Christian environment for learning and sharing. Those who engage in this behavior hurt not only themselves and the people around them, but the entire body of Christ suffers. Harassment based on race, color, creed, religion, national origin, gender, age, disability, marital status or sexual orientation means conduct of verbal or physical nature that is designed to embarrass, distress, agitate, disturb, or trouble another person. This behavior has no place in a Christian community. Harassment may include, but is not limited to, the following:

- verbal, physical, or written harassment or abuse
- repeated remarks of a demeaning nature
- implied or explicit threats concerning one's grades, job, etc.
- demeaning jokes, stories, activities directed at a student, volunteer, or employee

OCCASIONALLY there may be...

- a violation of the above policies
- excessive tardiness or absences
- disruptive or inappropriate behavior in groups
- lack of parental involvement or cooperation
- unforeseen personality conflicts with the catechist or group members

TO REMEDY any of the above situations...

- first, contact should be made between catechist and parent to discuss the situation and possible solutions
- **second**, if problem persists, the catechist or parent should contact the appropriate staff member to explore further alternative solutions, such as arranging a meeting of all involved and inviting the parent to attend the group sessions. The staff may also provide techniques that may be used to alleviate the situation.
- **third**, if the above measures fail to produce an improvement in the situation, the staff will offer parents the option of continuing faith formation in the context of their own home.

WITNESS

For I was hungry, and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty, and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me. – Matthew 25: 36-37

In order to grow as Disciples of Christ, we must reach out to those in need around us. Our Catholic Church has proclaimed its social teaching for more than 100 years! Our faith offers us guidelines to follow when reaching out to others and working for justice, equality and human dignity. These are the called the **Seven Principles of Catholic Social Teaching**. Each month, October through April, our staff and catechists will highlight one of these principles. There will be one targeted service project each month which crosses all grade levels. Listed below that key teaching, there is a list of other ways in which your family might address that principle through various service projects. We ask that your family support and participate in these opportunities to be Christ to others.

OPTION FOR THE POOR AND THE VULNERABLE (OCTOBER)
